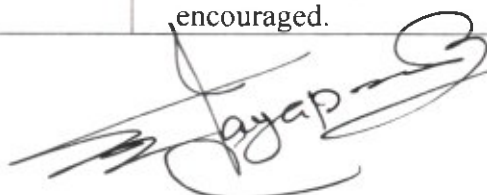

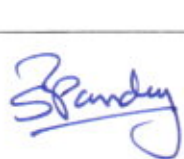

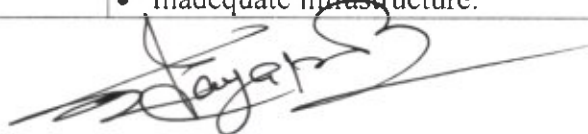

- A Placement Cell may be formally established to increase the competitive abilities of students.

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- ✓ Boys' hostel which is in a dilapidated condition has to be demolished and re-constructed immediately.
- ✓ College may develop a perspective plan for future development for the next 10 years and present it to the Government for necessary action.
